

The Image Rights (Bailiwick of Guernsey) Ordinance 2012 Moral Rights - Section 65, 66 and 68

For the purposes of this guidance note it should be noted that moral rights apply to 'natural persons 'only (\$75 of the Ordinance).

A Personnage whose personality is registered in accordance with the legislation has the right to be identified as the right holder whenever a person uses a protected image associated with, or registered against, that registered personality which is then made available to the public (s65 of the Ordinance).

A personnage is deemed to have been identified:

- when the protected image is made available, the personnage is readily identifiable to a person seeing or hearing the image—and the identification is clear;
- If a person uses a protected image in any of the circumstances set out in s27(3) of the legislation—for example in a communication to the public, in connection with sponsorship, for the purpose of marketing or endorsing goods etc (please refer to this section of the legislation for full details);
- If the image has been made available to the public by means of copies, rental, performance, communication (please see s34(3) for full details of the manner in which the image is made available which would mean it is subject to this provision in the law).

A personage's moral rights have not been infringed **UNLESS** they have been asserted in accordance with s66 of the legislation which states that the rights may be asserted generally by:

- an instrument in writing signed by the personnage;
- An assignment of a registered personality or a registered personality's image rights
 which includes a statement from the personnage in relation to their right to be
 identified.

In addition to the above—s68 of the Ordinance provides that a personnage whose personality has been registered has the right not to have protected images associated with or registered against that registered personality subjected to derogatory treatment.

The Bailiwick of Guernsey Image Rights Register, which is published on the Intellectual Property Office website, will include a Y/N indicator as to whether a personnage has generally asserted their moral rights.
